## **Students as Mythmakers**

You've read numerous stories from Greek mythology, including *Heracles, Echo & Narcissus, Pandora*, and more. To demonstrate your understanding of Greek mythology and epic heroism, your job is to write a myth explaining how something was created (**explanation myth**) or create a story full of action that teaches a lesson (**adventure myth**). Moreover, your myth must include the following criteria:

- 5+ paragraphs long, or 25+ sentences in length
- A title
- Epic hero as your main character (created in class using the "Hero's Journey" website)



- Inclusion of 2+ Greek gods & goddesses
- At least 3 literary devices, LABELED in parentheses after each use
  - Options include: personification, simile, metaphor, alliteration, onomatopoeia, dramatic irony, hyperbole
- Examples of the following sentence types, LABELED in parenthesis at least once:
  - C = compound
  - CX = complex
  - CC = compound complex

## Use the following steps to begin creating your myth. Then, fill out the brainstorm sheet attached.

- 1. Choose a main character. Use your "Hero's Adventure" character we created in class OR create new character. Either way, make sure your main character meets the ideals of an epic hero.
- 2. Create a conflict. What challenges will your character have to face? How will they overcome these challenges? What will be the climax or turning point of your story?
- **3. Develop a plot.** In what order will the events happen? Map the plotline out before you start writing. Be sure to use details to support your story.
- 4. Decide on a setting. Where is your story going to take place? How will you describe it?
